I have worked in DCU since 1995 and after successive promotions I am currently Associate Professor of Government in the School of Law and Government. I am a former editor of *Irish Political Studies*, the leading journal of political science in Ireland published by Taylor and Francis. In 2007 I was appointed DCU's first Director of Research/Dean of Graduate Studies. I am the President of the *Political Studies Association of Ireland* having been elected to that position in 2009 for a three year term. I am currently on sabbatical leave for 2011 – 2012 in the United States at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill on a Fulbright Scholarship.

I was one of RTE's main analysts in relation to *the Irish General Elections of 2007 and 2011, the Irish Presidential Election of 2011, the European and Local Elections of 2009, the US Presidential election of 2008, and the Lisbon Treaty Referendums of 2008 and 2009*. I appear regularly on RTE, TV3, Today FM, and Newstalk and have been quoted as an authority on Irish politics by a number of national and international newspapers. These include *The Irish Times, Irish Examiner, Sunday Independent, Sunday Tribune, Sunday Times, The International Herald Tribune and The New York Times*. I have also written a number of opinion pieces for the *Irish Times, the Irish Examiner and the Sunday Independent*. I have appeared before a number of Irish Parliamentary Committees to speak on lobbying regulation, electoral reform, and parliamentary inquiries and my work has been cited in both Dáil Eireann and Seanad Eireann.
