FEATURED COURSES:

RUES 730 "IDENTITIES AND TRANSITIONS"

The former Communist states of East-Central Europe and the former USSR have faced fundamental issues concerning the nature of states, nations, market economies and democracy. The experience has taught us new things about old questions and has raised a range of new questions. RUSS 441 "RUSSIAN LITERATURE AND CULTURE, 1881-1945"

This course presents a survey of representative works of fin-de-siecle Russian and early Soviet literature and culture. Students will study the major movements in Russian literature, art, theater, and cinema. Readings will be in English. Fall semester, MWF, 3:00-3:50. Instructor: Dr. Radislav Lapushin.

HIST 161 "RUSSIAN HISTORY TO 1861"

Focusing primarily on the origins of early East Slavic societies and the formation of the Muscovite state and Russian Empire, this course emphasizes the political, cultural, and social components of pre-revolutionary Russia from the tenth through the nineteenth centuries. The multiple forms of state-building, the dynamics of ethnicity and empire-building, and the role of gender, class and ideology receive special attention. In addition to providing factual background on Russia's past, this course emphasizes historiographical interpretations; it will also make extensive use of original primary sources. Fall semester, TR, 2:00-3:15. Instructor: Dr. Louise McReynolds.

HIST 783 "TOPICS IN RUSSIAN HISTORY"

This is the capstone course for those in the Russian/East European Studies program, although the seminar will be of interest to anyone looking for an introduction to the field(s). Our goal is to provide concentrated, in-depth looks at some of the major topics in nineteenth- and twentieth-century Russian and East European history such as nationalism, industrialization, the effects of war on society and politics, totalitarianism, and revolution. Weekly assignments will consist of one book a week and a short paper assignment.

Fall semester, W, 6:00-8:50. Instructor: Dr. Chad Bryant.
