

How to cite bibliography

In the text include name of the author (be it the author of a book or of a chapter inside a book, or of an article), year of publication and page from where you got the information you are citing. For example:

(1) As Feargal (1999: 30) argues

(2) “The success of the party from 1920 to 1969 was due largely to its capacity to achieve unity.” (Feargal 1990: 11)

Also, cite the complete work at the end, in the bibliographical references:

(1) An edited book (you cite this if you used the whole book):

Mitchell, Paul and Rick Wilford (eds.). 1999. Politics in Northern Ireland. Boulder: Westview Press.

(2) An article inside an edited book (you cite this when you are using just this particular chapter/article):

Cochrane, Feargal. 1999. “The Past in the Present,” in Mitchell, Paul and Rick Wilford Politics in Northern Ireland. Boulder: Westview Press.

(3) A non-edited book (you cite this regardless of how much of the book you actually used):

Cox, Gary W. and Mathew D. McCubbins. 1993. Legislative Leviathan. Berkeley: University of California Press.

(4) An article in an academic journal:

Fearon, James. 1995. “Rationalist Explanations for War,” in International Organization. Vol. 49, No. 3.

(5) A newspaper article:

(a) If it has an author:

Holson, Laura M. 2004. "Succession is the Big Question at Disneyland," in The New York Times. 04/25/2004.

If it has no author:

(b) The New York Times. "At least two Die in Explosion at Plant in Illinois," 04/25/2004.
